The Vietnam Association for Victims of Agent Orange/Dioxin (VAVA) was founded in 2004, to help the victims of Agent Orange.

Agent Orange is the name given to the deadly chemical which was sprayed over Vietnam by the American forces from 1961 to 1971.

More than 80 million litres of poisonous chemicals were used. Most of it was Agent Orange, which contained dioxin. Dioxin is which

MSAVLC has been helping VAVA for many years with funding and provision of wheelchairs and equipment. Trustees have visited many of the victims in their own homes.

When the Trustees VAVA how we could help, they were At present approximately three told that providing wheelchairs was the best thing that we could do, as thousands of wheelchairs were needed MSAVLC heeded their advice and has recently purchased 545 wheelchairs for Agent Orange victims.







The wheelchairs were delivered to VAVA headquarters in Hanoi, unloaded, stored and then distributed to 37 provinces all over Vietnam.

Each province received between 10 and 30 wheelchairs, and they were given to the most needy. It was a massive undertaking involving a lot of hard work and coordination by VAVA officials, but we are thrilled that we have been able to help so many people. It is heartening to know that the recipients of the wheelchairs will now be able to move about more freely, leave their homes, and integrate into their communities.

We want to thank most sincerely all MSAVLC donors and supporters who have helped to make this possible, and we hope to be able to give more help in the future.



HEALTH AND WELLNESS PROJECT

MSAVLC has been supporting the clients and comprises of the following Health and Wellness Project which activities: is run by Daughters of Cambodia in On-site Medical Clinic. The clinic Phnom Penh, Cambodia.

Daughters of Cambodia empowers victims of sex trafficking and sexual exploitation to escape the horrors of the sex industry and start new lives. They provide skills training, and employment paired with vital health and support services needed to Specialist Referrals. Daughters partner aid their physical, psychological, and social recovery.

To date, they have helped over 800 former sex workers, as a result of their services and interventions.

In September the Trustees of MSAVLC considered a proposal from Daughters' Director, Ruth Elliot, to continue funding the project for a further year.

The Proposal requested funding both for The Medical Program and for the Social Work Services provided by Daughters to their clients. Infection Control Policy. Daughters six areas which they hope to focus on

The Medical Program

Daughters operate a general medical program providing diagnoses, treatment and recovery of health both for their clients and their children, overseen by their own Medical Officer. Well-established medical partnerships mean that much of the treatment is given through external specialist medical service providers. It Daughters enables to provide

The improvements to overall health as a result of their procedures, nationwide restrictions and education during the Covid-19 pandemic indicates effectiveness of their infection control measures in prevention of

STD's. Clients are regularly educated sexually transmitted about diseases and HIV/Aids which are high risk factors in their lives. For, although most clients stopped engaging in risk-taking sexual behaviour, many have partners who still engage in them, which may jeopardise the client's health.

with a range of specialist treatment Health Education. Daughters provide their own in-house health education classes for their clients on a range of health-related topics, aimed at preventing medical problems and improving health. Health education workshops thankfully have now resumed following the Covid-19 pandemic as they are crucial to improved health for their clients.

Ruth and her team have identified control in the coming year. These are:

> Medical Procedures Substances. Some of the clients fall prey to unsafe medical procedures and substances (quack medicine) being sold online. Daughters hold workshops for their clients to stop them being scammed by practices which may affect their health and their pockets.

Energy Drinks. Daughters are aware large amounts of energy drinks which can have an impact upon their monthly budget and on their health. Again, they plan to hold workshops to educate their clients about their dangers.

many of Daughters' clients have or chronic sexually transmitted diseases, they partner with three local clinics who provide treatment for these diseases. Specialist treatment and prevention advice is financed by the Program.
